

Time was when few would have disagreed with the good doctors judgement. Now things are less simple and pubs are not the focus of all our attention. O.K. we still go out and get blathered on Friday night, but what about the rest of the week? Well, there's the off-licence, the BYO kit, all that cheap stuff you brought back from Dunkirk in the transit van. These days, in the town centre especially, an Inntrepreneur "to let" might greet you as often as a landlords smile. The difference on Sunday evenings is particularly marked. When I first arrived here in 1979 I was startled at the vitality of the Sunday evening sessions. Any worries about Monday morning were dissipated as punks surged along Bradshawgate. Now it has been replaced by a deadly calm. Cynics might argue that there are fewer people to worry about work on a Monday morning. But surely there is more to it than that. Caught in a "triple whammy" of recession, brewers greed, and TV/ video saturation, fewer people seem able or willing to enjoy pub going on a regular basis. The results are obvious to see. Its worrying for us, but enough to make the good doctor revolve in his grave...

Yet it is not all gloom. They might struggle along Bradshawgate, but its

showtime at The Cattle Market in Thynne street. A steady trade, enlivened by weekly gatherings of Wanderers fans has been transformed by the opening of "Orlando Village", the long overdue B.I.H.E. student halls of residence. Its not exactly "dreaming spires", but it provides basic accommodation for 380 students and is dead opposite the pub. The results are obvious, I found it packed recently on a Monday night, with Thwaites Bitter at £1 a pint and the ubiquitous "old Speckled Hen" as a guest. The best of luck to Margaret and lets hope that the new concentration of students here and in Chadwick Street will have a beneficial effect on boozing in Bolton


I note that the Deane Campus Bar has been refurbished (again) and Steve Kerry informs me that regular guest beers supplement the house ales. Irritated at being refused entry to watch the recent England vs Holland debacle, I later returned to glumly swill a pint of Tetleys. I was however discomforted by the apparent (and disgraceful) lack of sympathy shown to our plight by a largely gaelic clientele, and slunk off to the Gilnow for a pint of "old Shilling" ("boys beer" perhaps, but hard to ignore at 95p/pint)

"by eck its gorgeous..." nothing wrong with the adverts but surely something wrong with the hard sell? Indeed, had the recent vote gone our way, might we now be bracing ourselves for the "Boddingtons Olympics"? A recent article in

the Sunday Independent confirmed the recent remorseless progress of "the Bodken". Production of bitter has risen from 200,000 to 500,000 barrels p.a. Between 1989-1993 sales outside the North-west have rocketed from 5% to 50%. In 1989 boddingtons bitter was not even in the national top ten, now it is third behind tetlevs and John Smiths (both not exactly averse to self-promotion). Ten years ago locals told me that its quality and strength had declined. Recent tastings seem to confirm this view. One fears that the customer is being asked to pay not for a quality product but for a cultural experience. Does the Marshall Magee "red Barrel" law begin to apply? - "The more

### widely available a bitter becomes, the less one might wish to consume it "...

Finally, best of wishes to Tony and Rose Thompson who recently left "The Dog and Partridge". Tony has borne his recent illness with remarkable dignity and good grace, and one hopes that new landlord Vinnie can continue to make the dog one of the best and mos unprentious pubs in Bolton. Stil without a win, skipper Des Nogalsk wearily concedes that if his lads could talk themselves into a correct answer as speedily as they talk themselves out of a round they could be world beaters...

### Pub of the Year 1993

At the Annual General Meeting of the Bolton Branch of the Campaign for Real Ale at the York on Thursday 11th November the new pub of the year was chosen.

This was done by averaging the marks given to the 6 short-listed pubs on the visits of branch members over the last two months. The final six being chosen at a previous meeting for their appearance, beer quality and other factors that the branch considered important in a pub.

After the results had been averaged it was found that the Sweet Green Tavern had won the title for the second year running. This pub serves beer of an excellent quality and has up to two guest beers on all the time, three if you count the Imperial as a guest as it is listed on

the Guest ale board. The pub also serves a good selection of food at lunch times, these generous potions are at a reasonable price and of high quality.

Congratulations go out to Tony, Lilian and all their staff for keeping the Sweet Green Tavern as the best pub in Bolton in the eyes of CAMRA's Bolton Branch members.

The award of Pub of the Year 1993 will be presented to the licence at the January branch meeting. But for those who wish to visit the pub before that and meet the branch members the December branch meeting will also be held at the Sweet Green Tavern so check the branch diary for details



# Malt and Hops

The Malt and Hops bar at the Swan Hotel slashed its guest beer prices by upto 20p a pint in July. It was originally thought that this was just to celebrate its first birthday but prices have remained at this level since. Recently an excellent pint of Morrell's Bitter from Oxford was on sale at £1.25 a pint, probably cheaper than in its home town. On the negative side two handpumps have now been removed but there is still a choice of seven real ales: Burtonwood Mild and Bitter, plus Five guests.

Ed.- Further to this article it has been recently rumoured that the staff changes at the Swan Hotel may lead to the closure of the Malt and Hops bar as the real ale establishment it is now and revert to selling only Burtonwood beers. If this is true then it will be a big loss to both Bolton and the Burtonwood group, as this pub is popular with both Bolton drinkers and Camra members from other branches who visit this pub to "score" beers they have not had before. If these rumours are not true then we should be told because all this uncertainty cant be a good way to run a pub.

## Boar's Head To Go

The Boar's Head, one of Boltons oldest pubs, is expected to make way for an office block. The owners, Greenall's, put forward a planning application in september to demolish the Churchgate pub, the ajoining Chip Inn takeaway and Gatehouse cafe on safety grounds. All three properties have been empty for some time and the application is expected to be passed.

The Boars Head was built in 1721 and was once the towns principal inn being used as a post office and a magistrates court. It cams into Greenall's hannds in 1958 following the takeover of local brewers, Magee Marshall & Co.

After a refurbishment in1982 it became Bolton's first Greenall's pub in some years to serve real ale thruogh handpumps, it had previously served cask-conditioned beer electrically using the diaphragm system. It became an early outlet for Greenall's premium beer of the time, Original Bitter (not the same as Thomas greenall's Original), and appeared in the Good Beer Guide in 1095 and 1986.

During the late 80's Greenall's were forced to strengthen the pub's living quarters and in 1989 they lodged a planning application to demolish the pub and the two adjoining properties and replace them with a new pub and four stories of offices. The plan was rejected after the Borough Surveyor visited all three properties. He found that although both the Gatehouse Cafe and the Chip Inn required some atten-

tion the Boar's Head itself was it reasonably good condition. In Marcl 1992 Greenall's closed the pub and it September this year the current application was made to replace the three-properties with a four storey office building. Unlike the 1989 application however, there is no provision for a new pub. Bolton Civic Trust, who has publicly opposed the earlier redevelopment scheme, have withdrawn thei opposition on safty grounds following an inspection.

It is particularly sad that we are now to lose much of a conservation area in at attractive part of Churchgate. What was once a pleasant street in the shadow of the Parish Church will soon be a collection of ugly office blocks and isolated period buildings like the Olde Pastie Shoppe and the Man & Scythe.

Of course it should be argued that at unsafe building mustn't be allowed to stand, but in 1989 the Boar's Head was said to be reasonably sound. Now it is unsafe. Yet Greenall's do appear to have gone out of their way in the last fou years to do anything to save the pub of the ajoining properties and their thinking has been that, if left, it was only a matter of time before the properties became unsafe and at that stage any application for their demolition could not be refused.

Sadly the designation "conservation area" that used to describe that end o Churchgate has, in this case, proved to be worthless. It will continue to be so

until there is some responsibility on the part of the owners of properties like these to conserve. Conservation does not and cannot mean waiting for the property to fall into a sufficient state of disrepair to warrant its demolition and as long as this kind of attitude is allowed to prevail property developers will go on tearing down part of our cultural and architectural heritage before our very eyes.

This is the second Greenall's pub in

Bolton to be demolished in the space of a year. Last October the Clarence Hotel on Bradshawgate was demolished along with much of the adjoining row of shops. The Hen and Chickens on Deansgate was recently rumoured to be under threat of demolition with the site to be turned into a car park, but that threat has receded with the decision of the manager to take on the pub as a tenancy.

First stop was the Jolly Carter Inn on Church street where a choice of five real ales awaited the thirsty traveller .Beers on offer were Morland Old Speckled Hen; Taylor's Landlord; Cains Bitter; Boddingtons Bitter and Chester's Mild. Beers sampled were the Cain's and Morland Old Speckled with Hen(complete authentic glasses.)Landlord Rhys keeps all his beers in excellent condition and is worth his entry in the 1994 Good Beer Guide.

Next stop was the Church Inn,this pub is very much a younger persons pub and on the date of our visit a disco the volume of which was just below the threshold of aural pain,blared out into the street. The beer, the ubiqtous Bod-

dingtons was palatable.

After a five minute stroll we reached the Horseshoe this excellent boozer serves Hydes Anvil light mild and bitter via electric pumps. The Horseshoe is run by an ex rugby league player Michael J Hennigan and is well worth the journey from Bolton town centre to sample the proud Little Lever village atmosphere.

At this point the writer had to return home due to work commitments the following morning. However, there are other pubs in Little Lever which is worth the twenty minute bus ride from


Bolton centre. .
