Pubs in the 1985 GBG (£4.50) were

Bolton – Ainsworth, Halliwell Road; Alma, Bradshawgate; Boars Head, Churchgate; Falcon, Kay Street; Lodge Bank Tavern, Bridgeman Street, York, Newport Street with a try also of the Anchor, off Bury Road.

Chew Moor – Duke of Wellington

Farnworth - Bradford Arms

Horwich - Toll Bar

Little Lever – Horseshoe

Westhoughton – Brinsop, Chorley Road; White Lion, Market Street

The Old Three Crowns, Deansgate has had the Pennine Host treatment. The theme here is 'The English Alehouse', which has involved ridding the pub of its carpets and open fire. The floors are now just wooden boards and the comfortable seating has been replaced with bare wooden stools and chairs. A twelve-foot extension has been built at the back and the pub has a less congested look about it. Unfortunately, the traditional mild has gone, but Wilsons Original bitter is still on handpumps – at 70p a pint.

Further up Deansgate, at the junction with Marsden Road, the Gipsy's Tent has become Winston's free house. Extensive renovations have turned this three- roomed pub into what looks like an open-plan luxury bedroom. However, real ale remains at this ex-Tetley house in the shape of hand pumped Boddingtons and Stones Bitter.

Greenalls Original is now on sale at the Crofters Hotel, St George's Road, but has disappeared from the Queen Elizabeth, Fletcher Street.

In Branch Diary the January branch meeting was on the  $9^{th}$  at the George, with a social at the Lion of Vienna on the  $23^{rd}$ .

#### What's Doing February 1985

Greenalls Original bitter is now on sale at the Artillery & Volunteer, Radcliffe Road, Darcy Lever and at the Antelope, Manchester Road, Kearsley. However, the beer is no longer on sale at the Fourgates, Chorley Road, Westhoughton, leaving the Boars Head on Churchgate as the only one of the original Bolton outlets still selling the beer.

Meanwhile, Greenalls have closed and boarded up the New Zealand Chief on Great Moor Street and put it up for sale. They hope to sell it to someone who might turn it into a restaurant. On the other hand it might end up like other Greenalls disposals in Bolton town centre in recent years: The Anchor, Bury Old Road and the Rose Hill, Manchester Road are both free houses selling hand pumped Boddies bitter; the Alma, Bradshawgate now sells Burtonwood and the Ancient Shepherd, Bold Street, hand pumped Thwaites.

Branch diary had the branch meeting at the Derby Arms on the 6<sup>th</sup> with a Valentine's Day social at the Howcroft, red roses were optional.

The selective entry Greater Manchester Beer Guide was introduced, the Bolton Branch entries are below (note that the Westhoughton town heading was missing below Lostock's Duke of Wellington entry.

#### BOLTON

The pubs of Bolton Metro are dominated by two breweries — Tetley Walker and Greenall-Whitley. Together they own over 50% of the 290 odd pubs, but only manage to sell cask beer in about 35% of their outlets.

A small number of outlets were transferred from Tetley to Peter Walker and all these pubs sell cask beer.

Whithread own a significant number of pubs, but most of their pubs which are making half hearted attempts to sell cask beer are "The House of Horror" theme pubs.

Only Wilsons of the big breweries have an acceptable level of cask beer in their outlets, but the outlets in some cases have been spoilt beyond recognition by the Grand Metropolitan Managed House Group — Pennine Host. Lookalike pubs are something any town can do without.

lass show the way in how not to run pubs to suit the customer demand. Of their pubs they can only muster one real ale pump!

However, Burtonwood, Thwaites, Boddingtons, Hydes, Holts, Lees, Sam Smiths and Vaux all have small numbers of pubs and are all good bets for real ale, but for some reason Matthew Brown don't seem to be able to distribute cask beer to their 7 Bolton outlets.

Most of the breweries have outlets in and around the town centre, Farnworth and Westhoughton are also relatively well off for real ale. However some of the outlying suburban areas are very badly off for real ale pubs, but there is usually the odd oasis around luckily.

#### What's Doing March 1985

This was the month when Bolton moved from 10.30 to 11.00pm closing time, except on Sundays.

Wilsons was also merged with Websters. North Manchester branch had held a meeting with Wilsons the week before but nothing was said about this. One thing that did come out of the meeting was that the George, Great Moor Street was to be refurbished with the help of the fittings from a Royton club.

Greenalls have closed another Bolton pub – the Black Dog on Halliwell Road.

A new Bass Cask list showed that only the Brinsop (Free) A6 with Draught Bass, Cask Bitter and 4X and the Lord Clyde, Folds Road with 4X Mild sold any of their cask beers.

In Branch Diary the branch meeting was at the Cross Guns, Deane Road on the 6<sup>th</sup> with trip to Hydes Brewery on the 20<sup>th</sup>. At this time Hydes Brewery was in Moss Side, and once through the gates they were locked. Also notable was the barbed wire on top of the walls and the lower roofs areas.

#### What's Doing April 1985

The Old Three Crowns, Deansgate, Bolton, which has reportedly lost trade following its conversion by Pennine Joke into an "English Ale House" by removal of the carpets and comfy seating, has resorted to press advertising in a desperate bid to increase custom: The good news is that the solitary cask beer, Wilsons bitter, is to be joined by Websters with a regular weekly guest beer, the first of which was due to be Timothy Taylors Landlord.

In Letters Sir, On & recent visit to the Brinsop Arms, a Good Beer Guide pub which advertises regularly in WD, the range of beers available was a rather mundane Boddingtons, Tetleys (including Walkers) and Bass (including; of course, the notorious Hammonds), No sign of Hartleys, Matthew Brown, Jennings, Theakstons, Robinsons or regular guest beers, all of which featured in the advertisement for the pub: Did these all run out of the same night? Is it purely coincidence that apart from Boddies bitter all the beers on sale were "big six" products? Two possible solutions occur to me:

- 1 The independent breweries' products sell the most and have to be "rested" to give the big boys a chance.
- 2 The pub is cutting back on its range and sacrificing the independent breweries beers in favour of the more "persuasive" big six members.

I recall that when our Regional Social was held there a more attractive range was featured. What is happening? I think we should be told as my visit suggested a rather misleading advert.

Meanwhile, up the road and round the corner, Chesters Bitter is still doing well at the Britannia, King Street, where it is now firmly established.

#### What's Doing June 1985


Greenalls have decided to sell two more pubs in Bolton. The Peel Hotel, Higher Bridge Street, and the Tanners Arms, Great Lever, are both closed and boarded up, having been classed as "unviable", which in the Peel's case is somewhat surprising. Tetleys have got in on the selling act, too. They have just sold the Railway Inn, a keg pub on Great Moor Street in the town centre, to a local property company. The pub has been sold as a free house. Any chance of an amber nectar emporium?

Visitors to Barnabys on Chorley Old Road, Bolton, have been refused service as the "pub" now chooses to sell drinks only to customers who are eating there. This would seem to defeat the Pennine Joke concept of the "Open House", as advertised on the sign outside. Do Pennine Joke intend to downgrade the licence to "restaurant only" at the next licensing sessions? Will somebody be doing this for them?

REAL ALE IN BOLTON (see centre pages) Any significant improvement in the percentage of real ale pubs is dependent upon the good sense or otherwise of the two Warrington breweries. Tetley Walker have shown no improvement in the last couple of years, apart from selling off some of their estate to the free trade. It is difficult to see why the majority of Tetley pubs in Bolton cannot sell real ale, but the brewery shows a marked reluctance to introduce it. On the other hand, Greenall Whitley have, perhaps surprisingly, introduced cask beer into several outlets and converted others to handpumps. Several pubs have been sold into the free trade whilst others remain closed awaiting developments. Whitbread now have a higher percentage of real ale pubs than either Tetley or Greenalls, even with their weird and often not very wonderful attitude to cask beers. It is difficult to understand why a pub selling three cask beers and short of stillaging space, with a change of manager can be turned into a keg-only outlet with the cry of "no demand for real ale". Whitbread pubs are still charging the top price for beer in Bolton. Most Bass pubs are grotty dumps or awful estate pubs with beer to match, though in the few that don't fall in these categories, real ale would be a distinct possibility; perhaps the brewery will wake up to this fact. Of all the breweries with a significant number of keg pubs, perhaps the one with the least understandable policy on cask beers is Matthew Brown, who only have one cask outlet in their nine pubs. Perhaps after the Scottish & Newcastle business has died down, they will concentrate on improving the situation. The solitary Vaux pub now sells Wards bitter as well as Samson, though it is uncertain whether or not a pint is a pint. The beer is still served in unlined, oversize glasses and so never filled to the top.

#### What's Doing July 1985

The arrangement which Jennings had with Bass to supply Bass pubs with Jennings Bitter had ceased and was replaced with a deal with Tetley Walker, this meant that Bolton lost no Jennings as Bass had never been clever enough to sell it in their Bolton pubs, but now Tetley Walker pushed the boat out and were selling it in one at the Albion on Moor Lane.

In Branch Diary there was a social at the Three Crowns in Little Lever on the 7<sup>th</sup>, with the branch meeting on the 10<sup>th</sup> at the George. Then a proposed minibus trip to Derby Beer Festival on the 13<sup>th</sup> followed by a social at the Cross Guns on Deane Road. Another social was planned on August 4<sup>th</sup> in Horwich at the Old Original Bay Horse and the Bay Horse.

#### What's Doing August 1985

The Howcroft was nominated as one of three Greater Manchester pubs for a Pub Preservation Award. The Howcroft (Walkers)in Bolton is not the sort of pub usually singled out for refurbishment being a typical end of terrace Victorian pub. It was possibly the bowling green which gave this urban pub a new lease of life. Alterations have improved the Howcroft without detracting from the amenities. A vault and games room still remain, as well as a much-improved bowling green.

The Blue Boar (Whitbread) on Deansgate, is now selling hand pumped Boddingtons bitter. The pub has got rid of its bare board and sawdust image with the installation of a carpet. Rumour has it that Pennine Joke plan a similar improvement at the much criticised Old Three Crowns further down Deansgate.

Tetley Walker provided a list of their pubs which would be selling Jennings bitter, in addition to the Albion, the Bradford Arms, Bradford St, King William III, Manchester Road, Clifton Arms, Newport Street were listed.

The Market Hotel in Brackley Street, probably the most attractive pub in Farnworth, is having the Walkers treatment. The pool room and snug are being merged, although the basic style of the pub will remain. As far as we understand the public bar is to be little altered. The mention of 'redevelopment' is normally enough to give any honest CAMRA member the shakes, but such has been the quality of the Walkers improvements in the Bolton area – at the Ainsworth, the Cross Guns, the Howcroft and the Hare and Hounds – that this should be a development to be welcomed.

Tom Hilsley has left the Boars Head, Churchgate for another Greenalls pub – Royal Oak Bradshaw. So far he's managed to install cask mild and handpumps, and he hopes to have Greenalls Original bitter on handpump before very long.

In Branch Diary in addition to the social mentioned in July, the branch meeting was at the Howcroft on the 7<sup>th</sup>, followed on the 18<sup>th</sup> with a social at the Royal Oak, Bradshaw. The early in the month social on the 5<sup>th</sup> was at the Crofters.

#### What's Doing September 1985

Bolton's cider pub, the Man & Scythe on Churchgate has had handpumps fitted to dispense the golden nectar. Nothing else has changed – Whitbread keg beers are still available for the eccentric.

An update to the Greater Manchester Guide (see February 1985 above) was included, this noted the change in licensing hours (11.00-3.00 and 5.30-11.00, Sundays 12.00-2.00 and 7.00-10.30)

The Peel on Higher Bridge Street had now closed, in addition to those listed above the Prince Rupert on Holmeswood Road was now selling Jennings Bitter. The Happy Hour at Winston's had ceased, the Bulmers cider had gone from the No Name in Harwood and at the Toll Bar in Horwich the monochrome TV had gone, but the Mild had changed to Best Mild.

#### What's Doing October 1985

The Anchor, a Boddingtons 'Free House' on Eagle Street, off Bury Road, has come up with a novel line in catering. Instead of building a single kitchen extension they've tagged a Fish and Chip shop onto the end of the pub. There is now an intercom behind the bar of the pub and patrons requiring fish and chips can order at the bar and have it brought round to them.

Two pubs in the Bolton area have received long overdue alterations. First of all, Wilsons have given their Pennine Host counterparts a lesson in pub renovation at the White Lion on the corner of Deansgate and Moor Lane. Comfortable seating has been installed in the lounge bar, which has been moved back, thus vastly increasing the size of the room, while the vault/games room has been extended into what was once the entrance to a courtyard. A number of old photographs in the lounge show the pub and its surroundings down through the years and make interesting viewing. The whole renovation is quite tasteful and not before time – it is believed that the last alterations of note were in the early 1960's. Hand pumped mild and bitter remain.

The Market Hotel, Brackley Street, Farnworth re-opened on November 6th having had the "Walker's treatment". Extra seating has been put into the main lounge but the pool table has gone and the room it once occupied has been partly knocked into the small lounge next door, however the vault has not been touched and indeed, it remained open during the renovation period.

The Market has had a difficult time over the last few years, while lunchtime trade has been excellent due to the pub's proximity to Farnworth market, evening custom has been almost non-existent, Farnworth drinkers preferring the plethora of pubs on Market Street, the main thoroughfare, most of which are keg.

Like all the pubs in this area of the town, the Market will be looking to take some of the expected extra custom with the forthcoming opening of the "City Lights" nightclub. Formally known as "Blighty's" the club has been bought by Mancunian female impersonator "Foo-Foo" Lamar, who intends to turn it into the most spectacular nightspot outside London. The venture has cost Foo-Foo well over £1 million including a £200,000 light and laser show. Real ale drinking disco-revellers intending to boogie-on down to "City Lights" might enjoy a pre-club pint at the nearby Church (Thwaites), the Rawson's Arms (Burtonwood), The Wellington and The Britannia Inn (both handpumped Chester's bitter) and The Saddle (Tetley) as well as the afore mentioned Market Hotel.

At the other end of Farnworth The White Horse, Egerton Street, is now selling handpulled Jennings bitter under the Tetley/Jennings trading agreement, unfortunately landlord Brian Rostron says that initial sales have been disappointing.

Finally, an apology, in a recent *Whats Doing* we said that the Bradford Arms, Buckley Lane, Farnworth sold keg Oldham, it does not nor has it ever done.




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

The other pub selling strong ale is the Horseshoe on Lever Street, Little Lever. It has the rich and fruity Anvil Strong Ale known as XXXX(o.g.1080) and is sold straight from the barrel on the bar top at £1.20 a pint. Hydes the brewers of this fine ale also have an outpost in Affetside, North of Bolton, . the Pack Horse, which is just on the wrong side of the Bolton/Bury Boundry. The XXXX is the ideal

# Bouncers.

Ten years ago things were different. You had pubs and you had clubs. In pubs, in those distant days when you could buy a round without fumbling for a fiver, you would have the choice of boozing in the bar or drinking in the lounge. Most pubs had that division then. If you wore working clothes, wanted a cheaper pint and a game of darts or dominoes, you went in the Public. If you were dressed up, out with the wife, or talking shop with the boss, you went in the lounge. You paid slightly more for the "ambience" and you accepted that.

There were then, as there sometimes are now, signs up emphasising that people in "working clothes" should respectfully drink in the public etc. etc... One might question whether an accountant in three piece suit is, as much as a labourer in muddy jeans in "working clothes", but one takes the point.

If you went to discos, you accepted reluctantly that the rules of the game were different. "Dress standards"were interpreted by the bouncers with varying degrees of common sense and fact. If they didn't like you, you would not get in whether you were wearing smart clothes or not. Absurdly, on quiet nights you would be welcomed in wearing exactly the same clothes that would bar you at weekend. Equally absurdly, girls would usually get in whatever they were wearing however numerous, whereas men even singly would be subject to a "dress check" reminiscent of "Checkpoint Charlie". Complaint was useless. The bouncers word was law, backed up by force if necessary. Now the bouncer is a formidable sight in the pub as well as the club. I believe this is wrong. Why?

The right of the landlord to refuse service to, and eject customers without reason is enshrined in law, though at times it might seem arbitrary. Surely this right is his and not lightly to be devolved to bouncers/doormen who will by definition reinterpret who is and who is not fit to enter a PUBLIC house. If one is drunk, violent or vomiting of course one should no be served, but that should be a relatively, simple judgement for the landlord to make.

# Editorial.

The Bolton Branch of 'CAMRA' is now entering its tenth year. The current local membership is around the 100 mark, and of these some twenty or so come to Branch meetings and socials. The Branch has arranged many brewery visits in the past, and these have included Thwaites, Greenalls, Hydes, Tetley, Robinsons, Sam. Smiths, Wilsons, Whitbread (Salford) and a few others further afield. On occassions we have had speakers from breweries, who have given talks, slide shows, films etc. of different asspects of brewing and answered members questions. Just recently, Matthew Browns of Blackburn (who have nine pubs in the Bolton Metro area) have been saved from the threat of being taken over by one of the BIC SIX breweries, Scottish and Newcastle. This threat would have given the pub goer less choice of beers, as past experience has shown, some if not all of Matthew Browns Four Breweries would have faced the axe. This is not that the breweries are old, producing bad beer, but because S & N have a lot of spare capacity. Only the action of the Matthew Brown Board and pressure groups, like CAMRA, has been able to fight off the takeover threat. This has left a little egg on the faces of the S & N Board, as they were not allowed to takeover the Hartlepool Brewery of Camerons by the Monopolies Commission.

The 'real ale' scene in Bolton has improved dramatically in the past ten years, and signs are that this trend will continue. At the time of writing, two pubs in Bolton are due to go over to real ale. The Sunnyside, Bloom Street, will open its doors as a 'free house' selling a selection of cask beers. Also the Railway on Gt. Moor St. will reopen as the 'Quill and Pen' selling cask Tetley and Jennings beers.
